President Robert opened the meeting by asking Mickey Baer to lead the group in the Pledge of Allegiance. Jimmy DeMay gave the Invocation,



### **March 21 Program Notes**



Dr. Nabil Saleh presented a compelling history of Egypt, focusing on the last two centuries. He opened the talk by wishing a Happy Mother's Day. Egyptians, he said, celebrate Mother's Day

on the first day of spring.

Dr. Saleh said that the first things he learned about Egypt when he was in kindergarten were: Egypt is the gift of the mind and Egypt is the mother of the world.

He said that Egypt as a mother went through so many births, giving birth to many gifts to the world, including architecture, paintings, arts, sculpture and medicine. He added protecting the environment was important as well, saying that when an Egyptian died centuries ago, they buried him with a document that said the person was a good citizen, followed the law, lived honorably and never polluted the River Nile.

Dr. Saleh said that Egypt has gone through many hundreds of difficulties through the centuries, whether it was through invasions by other countries or upheavals within the country.

He said that Egypt is the only country mentioned by name in the three holy books: The Old Testament, New Testament and Koran. He said that Egypt was visited by Abraham and Sarah, Joseph, Moses and was the destination of the Holy Family.

Flash forward to the Ottomans, who conquered Egypt in the 1500s.

That was followed by the Muhammad Ali Pasha dynasty, which began in 1805 after expelling the French. The British eventually occupied Egypt in 1882 and ruled there until the Egyptian revolution.

1926 saw the formation of the Muslim Brotherhood, a secret society.

In 1948, Gamal Abdel Nasser led a revolution in Egypt and was eventually elected president. He nationalized the Suez Canal in 1956.

Nasser died and was succeeded by Anwar Sadat. In 1973, Egypt began a war to regain part of the Sinai territory Israel had captured six years earlier.

Henry Kissinger was able to broker a peace deal between Egypt and Israel. That did not sit well with the Muslim Brotherhood and radicals. They felt that Sadat insulted them and Egypt and assassinated Sadat in 1981.

Hosni Mubarak followed in power after the assassination of Sadat. He ruled for 30 years, before resigning and fleeing to Cairo in 2011 when protests to his regime began.

Dr. Saleh said that the Egyptian neighborhood has not been the most peaceful neighborhood. He said that Egypt

lives in a very war tormented zone.

In that area there are conflicts between

Israelis and



Palestinians; Turkey and Kurds; and Kingdom of Saudi Arabia and Yemen. Libya is occupied by ISIS and fighters who left Syria and Iraq, because the U.S. chased them to Libya, which is on Egypt's western border.

He said the challenge Egypt is facing now is the rise of the Muslim Brotherhood, which has a chokehold on Egypt.

What are the challenges today? Dr. Saleh will finish his talk April 4.

### Ruth McLaren shares two pieces of correspondence . . .

The 2<sup>nd</sup> came into the Club mailbox . . .

In 1980, The Oak Park River Forest Rotary awarded our daughter, Wendy Rietz, a twelvemonth Rotary scholarship to Deutschlandsberg, Austria. The goal was to promote international understanding between countries, Rotary members, and the students involved. A lot of time has passed, but the benefits of this scholarship did not end on Wendy's return to America, and we wish you to know how this looks played out.

John Edwards invited Richard (Wendy's father) to a Rotary meeting when a Rotary scholarship student presented her experience from her time in South Africa. John suggested that maybe our daughter would be interested in applying for such a chance. Richard went home and the result was that Wendy applied and was selected.

We believe the Lord played a part, as there are so many connections that were not planned. First was that Wendy spent each of three years attending OPRFHS summer schools, as she felt it is difficult to fit in 4 years of math, science, English, and required courses in the regular school year. She also enjoyed being in the summer musical(Sound of Music) at the high school. This turned out to be important as Wendy was allowed to graduate on time without having to take an additional year of high school upon her return from Austria. The Austrian family she stayed with was the Koglers, who had two daughters and a son, all close in age.

On the day Wendy left for Austria, the air controllers were on strike and she missed her flight connection in Frankfurt, and also missed her flight in Vienna. This is a girl traveling with a year of clothing in a huge bag. Neither we nor the Koglers knew where our daughter was, so called information but could not locate the Koglers. We decided to call the Austrian police, and found out the Koglers business was across the street from the police station and problem was resolved.

Now some related benefits occurred. Helga (Wendy's mother) was born in Cologne and came to the USA with her parents as a teenager. Helga, this made her first and only trip to Europe and came home with Wendy in August. Richard also made a trip to the Koglers, which included skiing with them at St. Anton. The unbelievable part is that Helga did not want Richard. To go to Austria as she felt we needed the money for Wendy to attend Indiana University. Needless to say, Richard was a little upset so went and bought a lottery ticket (5,6,7), and can you believe those numbers came up n that

exact order, and Richard won about half the cost of his plane fare! This also allowed Richard to have a guided tour of Vienna from his daughter. Inter sting side note is Wendy had to go to Vienna to take her SAT test on the exact date it is given all over the world.

Christmas in Austria: The soloist for Christmas, midnight mass became sick, and the director was distraught, but 17-year-old Wendy told him, "I can do the solo." (In Latin). The director was ecstatic. Wendy had always been in chorus and taken voice lessons. One of Wendy's classmates recorded her. Solo, which she has on tape. People asked, "Who is the soloist?" Americana. The Austrian Rotary was fairly new, so they waived the men only meeting so Wendy could make a presentation about America.

This might have been the end of the story, but it is not. One of the Kogler girls (Katrina) came to America and we enrolled her for a semester with Wendy at Indiana U. In the school of music. The boy also came and visited us, and Richard and he golfed several times. We have lost track of him, but last contact was that he was living in California and may have become a citizen. Richard won the right to buy two tickets to the Rose Bowl behind the goal posts that year, and took Karina, first to ski at Lake Tahoe with his friends, and watch the Rose Bowl Parade in front row customer bank seats.

As a result of Wendy living in Austria for a year, Wendy was able to earn two degrees from Indiana U. (In German and Math) in four years. Speaking German also helped her meet up and make friends in America with people from Bauer (aspirin) company, and was invited to enjoy German pre-Lent celebrations in Cologne.

More benefits from the Rotary experience: Richard was a director of the Oak Park YMCA, when a flyer came through about a 2-3-week trip to China, Richard went and became good friends with the tour guide in Beijing, who several years later came to Chicago, and Richard was his tour guide. They still communicate. Because of this connection, it was arranged for one of our sons and Wendy to go to China where our tour guide met them and handled sightseeing, etc.

More: The Koglers came to Florida, purchased a condominium and visited there in the off season. Wendy has visited the Koglers and Austrian classmates, as well as Koglers in their Florida home.

This story has taken a long time to unfold, but a lot of people benefitted from the opportunities that developed from that Rotary scholarship. We ask you to distribute this, so all present Rotary members can actually hear what can develop from a Rotary scholarship.

### KAIROS Prison Ministry Cookies

What would bring white and black gang leaders, Muslims, Atheists, the Lost, and Christians from many denominations together in a prison? Answer: A Kairos Weekend, which is where they will share food, cookies, and the Gospel message of love, forgiveness, and community. Kairos is an ecumenical Christian ministry in men's and women's correctional institutions. The ministry is conducted by teams of laity and clergy in cooperation with chaplains of correctional institutions. As part of a weekend program, we go into the institution and teach the residents the basic principles of Christianity and create a community that they can rely on for support. We also take over 2,000 dozen cookies into the institution and distribute to the entire population as a sign of God's endless love. I'll be a team member on the 33<sup>nd</sup> weekend at Stateville Correctional Institution near Joliet, IL and as a team member I hope to collect about 100 dozen home baked cookies. We have rigid requirements for cookies since they are taken into a prison, only home baked chocolate chip cookies please. Please use the recipe below, if you want to use your own, just make sure it's a sturdy cookie, best not to use butter or margarine since it makes a soft cookie. I will need the cookies before 18 April. If you make them before then please freeze them and I can pick them up or you can drop off to me. The weekend starts on 28 April. The recipe below makes 5 dozen cookies, please try and make cookies about 2 inches in diameter. I usually get a group together at a church and we can make about 10-20 dozen cookies in less than 2 hours. Please contact me if you have any questions. George Slenski cell 937-241-5556

### BASIC COOKIE DOUGH (MAKES 5 DOZEN)

1 cup shortening (not butter)  $2\frac{1}{2}$  cups flour

1 cup brown sugar  $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp. salt 1 cup granulated sugar 1 tsp. soda

2 eggs 1 tsp. baking powder

2 tsp. vanilla  $2\frac{1}{2}$  cups chocolate chips

Cream shortening and sugar until fluffy. Add eggs one at a time. Sift dry ingredients and add to creamed mixture. Beat in vanilla. Add chocolate chips. Drop onto cookie sheets by spoonful's. Bake at 350 degrees until medium too dark brown (from 13 to 20 minutes). Cookies should be 2 inches in diameter (size of Pringles lid). Cool cookies completely and place six cookies in a quart sized zip lock bag with no plastic zipper (packaging required by the Corrections Dept.).
