Sue began by summarizing last week's mini strategic planning session, aka S.W.O.T. In last week's RAZZ, Sue had asked that we each consider our top 3 choices in each of the four categories – Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats – and be prepared to answer a specific set of questions she had provided to us.

Sue then led the discussion and review of each of the four sections, opening the floor to the additional of any items missed or newly conceived. After a vibrant, enthusiastic and energetic discussion, each person was asked to vote for their top three choices of "items to work on first." President Nominee Eric Van Ness tallied and announced the counts the results of which appear on the previous page of this RAZZ. Frank Devlyn, founder of Opticas Devlyn and past Rotary International President, died


on Wednesday, May 27, at age 81, from complications resulting from a long battle with cancer.

Devlyn was a pillar of the Englishspeaking and international community in Mexico and an internationally recognized



humanitarian who worked endlessly to help the underprivileged, provide free glasses to those in need and to sponsor vaccination drives throughout the world.

Raised in Mexico along the Texas border, Devlyn also served as the honorary consul of Jordan in Mexico and was awarded the title of Entrepreneur of the Year in Mexico in 2016.



"My fellow delegates, I would like to remind you that the world of 1989 is very different to the world of 1905. I sincerely believe that Rotary has to

adapt itself to a changing world," said Frank J. Devlyn.

Frank was an impactful leader in Rotary whose
