A Note from President Sue . . .

Dear Fellow OPRF Rotarian:

While this is a time of uncertainty and upheaval for many, we are still excited to continue the good works of the Rotary Club of Oak Park - River Forest. We have been meeting weekly via Zoom and we appreciate your membership, your fellowship and your financial commitment.

Club membership dues comprise your Rotary International and District 6450 dues, your subscription to the Rotarian Magazine, and the costs of operating the Club including insurance and supplies. Member dues have also funded approximately 30% of the total cost of our annual Community, International and Youth service grants and projects. The rest of our significant charitable service work is supported through fundraising and sponsorships. We know that these two sources of funds will be significantly reduced this year because of the pandemic. Your continued financial support of our Club is more important than ever.

Our club's ultimate purpose is to embrace and support communities in need. While we do not know when we will be able to meet in person and share a meal, your Board of Directors are committed to continue to fund worthy philanthropic objectives. Your Board affirmed the current membership structure and dues levels for 2020-21 annual dues to remain at \$1,200 for Regular Members, \$600 for Entrepreneur level, \$500 for Senior Active Members and \$1,500 for Corporate Members plus \$300 per each additional Rotarian added to a Corporate Membership. Please select the membership level that works best for you.

You should have received an email this week with an invoice for 2020-21 dues. If you have not received an emailed invoice, please let me know. As in the past, you may make your dues payment in one payment or quarterly. Please direct all payments to the Club's post office box in Oak Park indicated on the invoice.

Please know how much your timely dues payment is always appreciated, since it helps to ensure that our all-volunteer organization can provide an excellent Rotary experience for all members and to meet our obligations to the shared purposes we value. As always, thank you for your support, and for the many ways that you embrace Rotary's motto of "Service above Self".





Rotary adopts
Supporting the
Environment
as the 7th Area of
Focus!

The Rotary Foundation Trustees and Rotary

International Board of Directors have both unanimously approved adding a new area of focus: Supporting the Environment.

More than \$18 million in Foundation global grant funding has been allocated to environment-related projects over the past five years. Creating a distinct area of focus to support the environment will give Rotary members even more ways to bring about positive change in the world and increase our impact.

Supporting the environment becomes Rotary's seventh area of focus, which are categories of service activities supported by global grants. It joins peacebuilding and conflict prevention; disease prevention and treatment; water, sanitation, and hygiene; maternal and child health; basic education and literacy; and community economic development.

Grant applications for projects will be accepted beginning on 1 July 2021. Gifts and commitments from Rotarians and others will be sought to provide global grant support for the new area of focus. More information about this new cause will be announced soon.

What Our Rotarians Are Doing Around the World . . .

Dr. Jaime Escobar, reports on the project . . .

Humanitarian Aid to

Trinidad, Beni, Bolivia

Now our world is suffering with a pandemic due to the "Virus COVID-19". The impact of the virus has been very significant in terms of lives, sick people and economic impact. The First World Nations, made up of the most powerful countries, have been targeted in a significant scale, but they have more resources and medical manpower to overcome this crisis.

In the Third World or Developing Countries, where the resources and medical manpower is very limited, they have a large percentage of needy and very poor people. The medical crisis is alarming and very different.

Many Members of our Beloved Club, some of them were in a mission in 2007 to Santa Cruz, Bolivia, and others went to San Jose, Costa Rica in 2012, along with other members and friends of Rotary, accepted the project to help the ICU, intermediate and outpatient clinic patients at the GERMAN BUSH GENERAL HOSPITAL in Beni, Bolivia.

We collected \$9,575.00 to buy medication for admitted patients in the ICU, intermediate and clinic patients who cannot pay for their medical care.

We hope that many lives will be saved with our donation. Thank you to our President Charlie Williams, one of the donors, to Cathy Hall, our Treasurer, and a million thanks to all the first-class Rotarians that donated for this noble cause. We hope to mitigate the pain and suffering of our needy Bolivian brothers and sisters.

The working committee included Sylvia Jewgieniew, D6450 AG and President of the RC of Chicago O'Hare. Additional donations came from the Chicago First, Chicago Northwest and friends. of the Illimani Rotary Club in La Paz, Bolivia - a Club of ladies only; Dr. Sharel Sadud, internist and medical advisor in Cochabamba, Bolivia and myself as General Coordinator. The Rotary Club Urbari [Santa Cruz, Bolivia] helped with bank transfers.

Thank you again to all. This project serves as additional proof of the Rotarian Humanitarian Spirit at the International Level.


