President Sue opened the meeting by asking Jan Arnold to lead the group in the Pledge of Allegiance. Sue then shared some announcements.

Daphne Ann Van Ness. 7lb. 14oz 21in long, was born at 6:47pm October 7th. Congratulations to proud new parents Eric and Dana Van Ness.



Oak Park and River Forest High School sophomore Jordan Arnold-Anderson spent his freshman spring break using a 3D printer to make more than a



dozen masks to donate to medical professionals. Jordan saw a need for additional PPE for medical professionals and used his creative skills to help.

Jordan found some plans online and using a manufacturer's instructions and antibacterial filament along with the proper fabric, he began making the masks - each mask takes almost five hours to fully manufacture. According to Jordan, "They print out

flat and I have to mold them with a hair dryer." He uses a foam head to help make the masks. "I don't want to touch them a lot, so that helps mold it." Each mask costs about \$1 to make, and Jordan said he will keep making them as long as medical supplies are needed.

Hearing what Jordan was doing, Lesley Gottlinger reached out to OPRF Rotary Foundation Chair Charlie Williams to see about making Jordan a Paul Harris Fellow. After all, what better example of Service above Self could there be! Jordan has already received his PH medallion, certificate, and pin, but wanted to thank the club for the honor. Not wanting to miss school, Jordan created a video to do just that as well as to explain the mask-making process. [Due to technical difficulties, the link to the video will be sent out separately to OPRF Rotarians.] Congratulations to our newest Paul Harris Fellow, Jordan Arnold-Anderson.

Sue shared that the Board had voted to approve the funding for a project the Township is undertaking to help people safeguard their medications and keep them from getting in the wrong hands. They are hosting a prescription take back day on Saturday, October 24th from 10 AM to 1 PM. They will be giving away pumpkins to encourage people to bring in their expired prescription medication, and to thank them.

October is National Medicine Abuse Awareness Month. To educate our community and provide the means to protect medications at home, the Township was thinking of purchasing medication lock boxes as giveaways. This effort would sync with at least three of the focus areas for OPRF Rotary:

- Disease prevention and treatment.
- Water and sanitation.
- Economic and community development.

The amount requested would purchase 104 Safer Caps @ \$6.99 = \$726.96 and 30 Safe Lock Boxes @ \$11.99 = \$359.70 for a **Total of \$1086.66**. Sue noted we have \$2000 in our budget for Projects this year. To date, none of those funds have been spent. Stickers will be placed on all the boxes to indicate that the funding came from our Club. They will also post on social media to give us further exposure.

Other announcements included:

- Get well wishes to Selma Belajec who had hip surgery 4-5 weeks ago. She is on the mend, and says she misses us. She is planning to return to Rotary when we begin meeting in person again.
- Get well wishes to Jaime Escobar who recently had knee surgery. Unfortunately, he had a major

- "problem" with the bad knee which affected the good knee which put him back in the hospital. He anticipated being released from the hospital Saturday, October 17.
- Keeping Bill Planek and his family in our thoughts and prayers on the recent loss of his mother Joanne.
- Keeping John Hedges in our thoughts and prayers on the recent loss of his brother and sister-in-law in an automobile accident in Indiana.

 Keeping Sister Michelle Germanson in our thoughts and prayers. She is in Hospice.

At program's end, Robert Stelletello lead the group in The Four-Way Test of the Things We Think, Say, and Do, and we were on our way.


With no other announcements or business, President Sue then introduced our day's speaker -OPRF Rotarian Dr. Nabil Saleh.

Program Notes

Nabil opened the presentation by sharing photos and giving a brief history of the Polio virus. He noted that Polio does notaffect any certain age group, rather it



attacks all ages and all areas of the world: Europe, Latin America, India, Africa. No one age or country is exempt!



Poliomyelitis has existed as long as human society but became a major public health issue in late Victorian times with major epidemics in Europe and the United States. The disease, which causes spinal and respiratory paralysis, can kill and remains incurable but vaccines have assisted in its almost total eradication today.



Nabil talked about how people catch Polio as well as the three different types and symptoms of each. In discussing complications, Nabil cited certain statistics:

- Between 2%-5% of children affected with paralytic polio die.
- whereas for adults, 15%-30% die.

He looked at treatment and care, stating there is not cure. He did say, however, prevention is the



answer. Dr.
Saleh also

1988. By 1988,
polio had
disappeared
from the US.

UK, Australia and much of Europe but remained prevalent in more than 125 countries. The same year, the World Health Assembly adopted a resolution to eradicate the disease completely by the year 2000.

Nabil then shared a timeline during the 1950's, taking it up then to 1999 when inactivated polio vaccine replaces oral polio vaccine as recommended method of polio immunization in the United States.

Rotary's partners since 1988 have included Pan-American Health Organization, World Health Organization, Centers for Disease Control, UNICEF and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

On September 25, 2020, the GPEI congratulated Dr.



Tunji Funsho, Rotary's Nigeria
National PolioPlus Committee Chair
for being named one of TIME
Magazine's 100 Most Influential
People in the world. Dr. Funsho's

leadership within Rotary and the GPEI partnership were instrumental in eradicating wild polio in Nigeria and the African region.

Dr. Saleh then offered additional statistics - which are now updated here even more . . .



As of October 15,2020:
Reported Polio statistics include:
4 wild polio cases this week
Afghanistan = 1; year-to-date = 52
Pakistan = 3; year-to-date = 77

In asking if we can succeed, Nabil pointed out that the Global Polio Eradication Initiative is focusing on 'every missed child' in Endemic Countries., ensuring even the most vulnerable communities are served.

As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

In closing, Nabil shared that our Mission must be to:

- Give.
- Build Awareness
- Become an Advocate

Success, he notes, must include giving! He then opened the floor to questions.


