

Program Notes

Lesley introduced our day's speaker Mikayla Onayemi, the Vice President for Public Image of the Interact Club of Greater Oak Park, River Forest, Forest Park. She is an absolutely amazing, modest, and extremely bright and inspiring young woman. "I am sure by the end of the program you will all agree."

Mikayla introduced herself as a 15-year-old high school sophomore. Mikayla explained that today she would be explaining how the Interact Club is advocating for social justice and more specifically how they came up with the idea and what they look for in books.

Mikayla spoke about how they came up with the idea. She noticed a lack of action related to social justice issues. She pointed out that the entire Interact club has a passion for educating people on social justice topics and promoting activities as well as a love for reading and discussion, so that was how they came up with the idea for a social justice book club.

They are also working on brainstorming some other ideas for social justice projects they can work on. They decided they would host a book club where they could read and discuss youth-oriented books focused on social justice and human rights.

The club has five main goals they hope to accomplish through the social justice book club and their social justice advocacy:

- 1. Learn about various social justice issues: We want to encourage people to avoid ignorance because being ignorant is choosing to ignore problems. Knowledge is power and he first step to becoming an activist.
- 2. Have thought-provoking conversations: We want to create a safe space to be able to talk about these difficult topics, and encourage people to share their thoughts, opinions and experiences. If we make it normal to discuss these items, we allow for action and change. These conversations allow for people to listen, learn and reflect.
- 3. Inspire and discuss ideas: There are many ways to advocate for social justice, and we want to inspire people to use their talents to make a difference whether that is writing, protesting, creating art, organizing, volunteering, or whatever it might be.
- 4. Take action and advocate for change: It is not enough to simply read these anti-racist or social justice books, we need to speak out and take action to pursue your ideas that we have discussed. We
 - can write to those in positions of power, fight for what we are passionate about, spread information, encourage others to learn more about social justice issues. The book club is really a first step.




5. Empower youth activists: It teaches young people to get involved and advocate for social justice which will create a new generation of strong leaders who are compassionate and have communication skills to make a difference.

Mikayla went on to disclose that when we look for our books, we make sure to choose books that incorporate a discussion of social justice issues and human rights. We look for books that discuss a variety of topics, such as racism, sexism, LGBTQ+ rights, ableism, socio-economic class, and that are:

- Inclusive and intersectional
- Empowering
- Interesting reads
- Youth-oriented

Mikayla went on to discuss each of the books the book



club has discussed. The first book we read was This Book is Anti-Racist: 20 Lessons on How To Wake Up, Take Action, and Do The Work by Tiffany Jewell and Aurélia Durand. This book is an informative, non-fiction book about antiracist youth activism. The book is split into 4 main sections each of which

Mikayla explained in depth. Mikayla also shared that the book is extremely well-written and graphically engaging, so it will catch and keep the attention of young people. She described it as an outstanding reference and resource for further continued study on racism. "This is a really powerful book!"

The second book, Watch Us Rise by Renée

Watson and Ellen Hagan, is a novel about two girls who are sick of the way women are treated, even at their so-called progressive NYC high school. As a result, they decide to start a Women's Rights Club. This book explores sexism, racism, sizeism, fatphobia, and ableism. We decided that this book



would be perfect for our club since it explores so many issues and empowers youth-activists to make a difference in their communities. Taking place in a school, this book had a lot of excellent conversation starters about education. The school believed it was doing a good job, when that was not the case. This sparked some amazing discussions and useful conclusions.

The upcoming book will be <u>It's Trevor Noah:</u>
Born a Crime: Stories from a South African
Childhood [Adapted for Young Readers]. In this book, Trevor Noah shares his story of growing up in South Africa, with a black South African mother and a white European father at a time when it was against the law for a mixed-race child like him to exist. For this book, Mikayla recommends listening to the audio book where the author Trevor Noah himself reads this well-written book.

Mikayla then shared a favorite quote of hers from Desmond Tutu that represents our attitude:


"If you are neutral in situations of injustice, you have chosen the side of the oppressor." Mikayla notes

"This quote emphasizes how harmful it is to not take action because if you are not taking action or speaking out against injustices, you're showing that you are okay with letting things be okay the way they are which is not good enough. We must be passionate about an issue, and then fight for it and be actively working towards a goal. Otherwise, it's just not enough. Otherwise, nothing will change if people stay quiet."

After thanking Rotary and the Club for providing a platform such as

this meeting that allows her to speak and for having the web site that gives her more of an opportunity to share including the blogs, Mikayla opened the floor to questions and comments.

Questions arose about whether Mikayla had ever seen any of Trevor Noah's presentations and/or interviews; why the adapted version is being utilized as opposed to the adult version; the current number of members in the Interact and book club. Mikayla was lauded as a very powerful speaker and encouraged to continue. Other questions included where Mikayla attends school - she is home-schooled. Mikayla was also asked if she ever gets criticized or accused of anything when she expresses her frank and honest opinions when it comes to racism. The answer in part was, "if you're showing up to one of these kinds of things, it's not likely you'll disagree with what's going on. . . " Mikayla was also asked if she had yet visited Nigeria. Throughout this Q and A exchange, DGN Ade shared information about Rotary's Youth Exchange, Interact and Rotaract programs and extolled the virtues of all He also praised Mikayla and shared how proud he is of her.

President Sue told Mikayla that the Club would be inoculating 50 children against Polio in her honor and providing her with a Speaker certificate.

Lesley shared a few announcements:
