

Interactors still need your recipes. The dates have changed, and the kids are hoping to have the book available for Easter giving. Please keep sending them your




favorites. Help them create a cookbook of AMAZING Rotary family favorites. There is even a Rotary VIP section planned.

[PDG Joan spoke at Scott's conference] **Good news:** the Type 2 novel oral polio vaccine will soon be rolled out (hopefully by year-end) to vaccinate in areas where the circulating vaccine-derived polio virus Type 2 (cVDPV2) is prevalent - areas where the population is under-served in the immunization of children with the polio vaccine.

**The not so Good news**: 2 new wild polio virus cases this week in Afghanistan - total year-to-date between the remaining endemic countries of Afghanistan and Pakistan is 137.

The work carries on with the goal of eradicating the polio virus from the face of the earth - a goal that Rotary will continue to work towards until the job is done. Full stop.
