Program Notes . . .

By way of introducing Dr. Saleh, Patty Eggerding shared that one of the things she misses about our not meeting face-to-face is sitting with Nabil at lunch. She noted that every time she would sit with him, she learned something new each time. She loved hearing about his life as well as the fact that he was the pediatrician for Ade Onayemi's children.

After thanking everyone for putting their trust in him to serve as a future Club President, Nabil shared his background beginning with being born and growing up in Egypt. He went on to talk about his education and early years as a doctor all over the world.



This is a disease that is changing our lives - not just during the pandemic but for a very long time to come. It has changed

our way of life ... our relationships ... the way we work ... our relationships with our families ... I also would like to contribute a few Happy Bucks because I have a new granddaughter who is about 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ months old and lives in California ... I am waiting for the day when I will be able to see her!

Today I want to distinguish the facts from the myths since we as Rotarians believe in the TRUTH. I also want to explore the dynamics of the effects on our society.

Nabil began with where we are now and shared some statistics. He planned to discuss how we go about testing, and then he will touch on what the future may or will look like.

As of March 28th, Dr. Saleh pointed out the numbers [to the left]. HE also shared slides and statistics showing the new strains of the virus including their strength and "spreadability." Nabil then showed us who are those who are the most vulnerable -

citing age, weakened immune systems, pregnant women, those with other medical conditions, and those from certain demographics such as people of color and those from low socio-economic strata.


He talked about how we test for COVID and the available methods for testing. Currently there are three - the following:

1. RAPID ANTIGEN TEST [15 Minutes]
2.PCR FOR NUCLIEC ACID [2-5 Days]
3.ANTIBODY IGG AND IGM [20 minutes]

Next, Dr. Saleh discussed the severe effects of COVID-19. He went on to point out that: "The greatest

success so far during this Pandemic is the fact that we managed to get a highly effective/ safe vaccine from conception to delivery in one year!" Especially considering that it typically takes a minimum of 3-5 years for that to occur.

Nabil sowed a slide comparing the different vaccines and their specific properties:



He also discussed how the mRNA vaccines work, telling us that if you feel after-effects, it just means that the vaccine is

working. He pointed out an astonishing statistic. "It is amazing to know the size of the COVID 19 Virus 2 X 10 to the power of 17 or 2,00,000,000,000,000,000 In other words, if you collected ALL the Corona virus in the world, it would fit into about half a can of Coca- Cola!!

As of March 27, 2021, we have administered 5,418,211 doses in Illinois, and about 140,180,735 total doses in the U.S.

Moving on, Dr. Saleh addressed how we manage to treat patients with COVID-19.

- 1. Education with clarity and transparency
- 2. Prevention of infections; managing other potential risks
- 3. Containment/Isolation
- 4. Testing and Monitoring
- 5. Tracing
- 6. Mostly Outpatient Management
- Medications: Supportive measures, control co-morbidities, anti-viral/monoclonal biological, vent, etc.

Nabil also covered the long-term effects of COVID-19 on the individual and family. He shared two stories of the long-term effects on children. Dr. Saleh then made recommendations for what we can do:

- Reduce Your Risk of Getting Sick
- Follow precautions: Mask, Distance, Wash, clean surfaces
- Continue your medicines:
- Have at least a 30-day [or more] supply of prescription and OTC medicines to reduce your trips to the pharmacy
- Do not delay getting emergency medical care because of COVID-19.
- Call your healthcare provider if you have any concerns about your underlying medical condition If you need emergency help, call 911 right away.
- · If you don't have a healthcare provider get one!

He closed with "I am anxiously optimistic. Is it a "New NORMAL" or an UNCERTAIN New Normal? We are never safe until the whole world is safe" and then Dr. Saleh opened the floor to questions and discussion.

Patty Eggerding then shared that Dr. Nabil would be receiving our usual speaker certificate which inoculates 50 children against Polio.

Martha Murphy led us in The Four-Way Test of the Things we Think, Say and Do, and sent us on our way.
