Program Notes:

Moving on to the program portion of today's meeting - new member classification talks... The first speaker for is Alexis Marcotte, although she is not that new, she has never had the opportunity to officially introduce herself.

Alexis works for the Boy Scouts, and as of June 3, it will be two years. She is the District



Executive first for Twin Lakes District until they merged with Portage Creek District. Personally, she was the staff advisor for the Council's Food program. Portage Creek District was able to

collect 10,000 pounds of donated items which converted to more than 5 tons of food which was donated to the Chicago Food Pantry or local food pantries. Overall, the Greater Chicagoland/Northwest Indiana Council collected more than 100,000 items or over 50 tons of food.

Scouts are always looking for volunteers, and Alexis is always available to answer questions. She graduated from NIU in 2019, and 2 days later she got her job with Boy Scouts and has been here ever since. Alexis has graciously accepted a spot on the Membership Committee.

The "Bonus Box" in the upper right corner of Sue's screen is the Sawyers - Debbie and Greg. Being



traditional, Sue chose to ask ladies first Debbie to speak first.

Debbie has enjoyed the meetings thus far. She

and Greg have raised two kids together whom they like. She shared some of her background including her time working as arbitrator with the Better Business Bureau, with CPS Board of Education training some of the Local School Councils in their collective roles and responsibilities, budgeting, and principal selection, and went on to chair the 28-member School Board Nominating Commission, recruiting, slating, and presenting proposed slates to the mayor for approval. She is now over the Concierge Desk at the Palmer House, a 1600-room property. Also involved with Choose Chicago, on the advisory board of Concierge Preferred, and is a self-professed pain because she likes to follow the rules. In answer to what drew her to Rotary, she said husband Greg brought her. They talked about it and settled on OPRF Rotary because we are a good fit for them. We are progressive, our goals, ideals and focus are the same as theirs. They were looking for something to do locally.

Greg took up the reigns to share and introduce himself. As a younger man, Greg had the opportunity to do a lot of cross-country travelling. He worked Phillip Morris for almost 20 years, until they downsized. Greg then attended Concordia University to finish his undergraduate work. He went on to work for Sears for many years. Last year, he spent last year with AARP and their Experience Corps working with pre-K kids teaching them to read until COVD shut them down. It seems everyone here is dedicated and wants to make a difference. That is what we want: to make a difference and provide some hope for the future. Greg also describes himself as a jazz impresario.

Sue then asked Carla Sloan if she ever had the opportunity to give her new member introduction. Sooo, there she was - in the hot seat.

Carla began by saying she has lived in River



Forest for 33 years. She has 4 kids, became township supervisor eight years ago. She got involved because her undergraduate degree is in government. She is also passionate about the many areas of focus we address. Her oldest

daughter has Autism which explains her interest in Developmental issues. She is hugely excited because the IL State Legislature just passed a \$170 million budget for those with disabilities. Certainly, they need more, but this is the biggest budget the state has ever approved. Sue pointed out that when Carla said she just wants to be able to begin to give back, she already has. Carla sits on our Rotary Club Board of Directors and along with Greg and Debbie stepped up to serve on the Community Grant Selection Committee.

We chatted about the beauty of upstate New York - Carle is from Schenectady, NY.

Ade reminded folks that the District Conference starts on Thursday. It is open, and it is free. We will be featuring our Interactors. Their next Forest Preserve clean-up is June 12.

trucks for the Rally on August 28. We desperately




need more food trucks within the next 24-48

Rotaract and Interact Update

New Generations refers to the youngest generation in the family of Rotary. Many are participants in Rotary's youth and young adult programs: Interact, Rotaract, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), and Rotary Youth Exchange.

Past RI President Luis Vicente Giay coined the term New Generations when he shared his belief that the future of Rotary relied on involving young people in the organization's programs and activities. At the 1996 RI Convention in Calgary, Alberta, Canada, he said:

"Our vision for the future, now more than ever, is the difference between success and failure. The New Generations are our investment in the future. Let us begin to build that future today."

New Generations Service became Rotary's 5th Avenue of Service in 2010. It is defined in article 5 of the Standard Rotary Club Constitution:

New Generations Service recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults through leadership development activities, involvement in community and international service projects, and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding.

Rotary clubs should be committed to involving youth and young adults in their vocational, community, and international service projects, and to providing programs and resources that support them.

Interact Clubs - Interact clubs bring together young people ages 12-18 to develop leadership skills and learn about the world through service projects and activities.

Four of our 25 Interact clubs reported notable service deserving of our recognition during this Rotary year!

The Interact Club of Bremen High School, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Oak Forest worked tirelessly to communicate with every student to let them know that they are not alone during this unprecedented year. Four juniors who wish to remain anonymous created Invisible Inspirations, to send care packages to their peers. Every Monday night these four students met with their advisor to determine how to reach other students, calling on the school social worker as well.

Some students received a red envelope care packages in the mail while others received an email. All received tips about medications, college, studying, and anyone who came to room 125 and asked for a personalized stress ball and hand sanitizer, received one. The Club also sent holiday cards, valentine greetings, etc. to nursing homes and the residents at The Pointe in Crestwood.

The Interact Club of Oak Forest High School, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Oak Forest found many ways to stay busy and contribute to their communities during the pandemic. A list of their activities for this year include:

- creating care cards for essential workers,
- care cards for local nursing homes,
- October food drive for Redeemer's Church Little Free Pantry,
- random acts of kindness for World Kindness Day,
- partnered with other local Interact groups to create/send Holiday cards for veterans and active duty service members,

- created Holiday and Valentine's Day cards for the OF senior citizens that typically attend school sponsored luncheons.
- virtual "check in" wellness checks event,
- fundraiser at Chipotle,
- OF covid mask fundraiser,
- created fleece tie blankets for Hope Children's Hospital,
- and another food drive in April for Redeemers Church Little Free Pantry.





These students also created accounts on the "Innerview" app where they keep a log of their service hours. Two of their juniors participated in the virtual RYLA retreat pronouncing it a valuable and positive experience.

The Interact Club of Rosary High School, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Aurora had a wide variety of outside service opportunities despite the many COVID restrictions in place at the school including all club meetings having to be held virtually, meeting virtually two Wednesdays a month., the girls have been in-person learning four days per week since the start of the school year. 45 members strong, they were able to participate various service opportunities.

This year's special project was holding a Suicide

Rosary High School Interact had many Projects!



Prevention Week; the goal was to inform the student body of signs of mental health issues and to raise money for Batavia's Suicide Prevention. The girls prepared and shared informational announcements with the student body daily; hung club-designed magnets on student lockers; sold Suicide Prevention bracelets; and had a wear purple and teal day [suicide prevention colors] where the student body had to pay \$1.00 to be out of uniform. The club raised \$600!

- Interfaith Food Pantry's Trunk or Treat Event
- Helping Catholic Corner Store decorate for Christmas
- Sorting toys at Toys for Tots
- Annual Christmas party for Catholic Elementary School, creating a Party in a Box for each grade level.
- Adopt -a- soldier letter-writing
- Making Birthday Boxes for a local food pantry.
- Easter Basket Distribution for Aurora Interfaith Food Pantry
- Adopt-a-soldier Easter Care Package
- Decorating for Candlelight Ball fundraiser at RHS
- Making blankets for the Linus Project
- Earth Day project
- Rotary Club of Aurora Food Pantry distribution day

The Greater OP-RF-FP Interact Club, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Oak Park - River Forest is a community-based club with fewer than ten members who have consistently met and performed services in the Community. The club meets virtually twice a month. In response to the protests last summer, the Interactors decided to learn about identities, accurate histories, and take action, performing anti-racism work. In July 2020, they started a Social Justice Book Club that meets quarterly to discuss books related to Social Justice and taking action.

The club maintains a blog on the Rotary Club of Oak Park - River Forest website on Environment Sustainability, Mental Health and Social Justice. From the latest blog, 4 Steps to Self-Care, comes the following:

"When things get overwhelming, it becomes difficult to remember to take care of ourselves. Remember that for you to give back, help others, and be a positive person, you must first take care of yourself." The article shares, "four steps you can take to improve your overall wellness and prioritize self-care."

The club is in the process of adopting the Fullerton Woods Forest Preserve of Cook County; They are tasked

with cleaning up the Forest Preserve monthly. They are

currently on a pact to clean the preserve for 8 consecutive months!

One of their members serves on the District











Environmental Committee and is a facilitator for the District's DEI Social Justice Book Club. She will also present and participate on a panel at RI's International Convention on Youth perspective on Social Justice.

Unfortunately, due to participation limits set for the virtual RYLA conference, only one of the three interested members could join the conference.

The club is working on a Recipe Book scheduled for publication on July 4 as a Fundraiser for their activities. You are welcome to send your favorite recipes.

Individual members participated and received service-hour credits for:

- Tutoring other students from grade school to high school
- Making masks for seniors and first responders; and
- Helping teachers with technology-related issues for their classes.

As our communities continue to reopen, they will go

back to their usual service projects:

- Toys for Tots
- International Potluck
- Rotary UN Model Conference
- Feed My Starving Children



Finally, I want to commend Gina Arguelles [Bremen HS], Kerry Fitzmaurice [Oak Forest HS], Mart O'Connor [Rosary HS], and Lesley Gottlinger [The Greater OP-RF-FP Interact Club] for their leadership as advisors to our youth.
