being a Quiet Hero...For 16 years, Bob has done


yeoman's work with these folks who are Peace Fellows...it's the behind the scenes, mentoring...shepherding them through the

President Sue then turned the meeting over to Patty Eggerding to introduce our speaker for the day,

Rotarian Robert Stelletello whose topic is . . .

Dementia
Awareness
Training
For General Public

Program Notes:



Robert began by sharing that he became involved with dementia awareness training because it is required for his business. You need to know how to interact with folks who have cognitive challenges and it is vital to working with them. He shared the historical beginnings of Dementia Friendly which started in England in 2012, and it came to America as Dementia Friendly America in 2015. Starting in River Forest in 2017, he gave some of the history of how River Forest and Oak Park history of became Dementia Friendly communities.

He noted that first you need champion organizations which in this case include OP Township, the OP Public Library, OP-RF Township Senior Services, and Park District of Oak Park. From there you need partnership organizations which we were able to see cover many diverse types of groups.

OUR COALITION - THE ACTION TEAM



The coalition then develops an action plan followed by an implementation plan. He then explained the agenda for the day's program:

What is Dementia? Dementia is an umbrella term to describe various symptoms including impaired thinking, reduced social abilities and loss of memory.

These symptoms are serious enough to interfere with activities of daily life. It's not really Dementia until it starts to impact your daily life.

What are the Different Types of Dementia?

He noted that the Lewy Body, Vascular and Frontotemporal being less common, and Alzheimer's being the most common.

Robert then shared some statistics:



And some projections:

The number of individuals **age 65+** with Alzheimer's disease is projected to increase.



How do you recognize Dementia when it "strikes?"



Remember, things like this happen to all of us at some time or other. Just because you lose your keys or can't find a word that's on the tip of your tongue once in a while doesn't mean you have Dementia. If you don't know what

the keys are for, however, might be the beginnings of a different question.

One or two of these symptoms is not an indicator, but when you start to see multiple symptoms, and when it starts to impact your daily life, that's a good indication that Dementia is beginning.

Robert pointed out that Dementia is different from Normal Aging. Some examples might include:

Normal Aging: Making a bad decision once in a while; Sometimes feeling weary of work, family, and social obligations; Becoming irritable when a routine is disrupted

VERSUS

Warning Signs of Alzheimer's Disease: Decreased or poor judgement; Withdrawal from work or social activities; Changes in mood and personality

What do you do if you see signs . . .

17 Schedule an appointment with your doctor.

[2] With early detection, you can explore treatments that may provide some relief of symptoms and help you

maintain a level of independence longer, as well as increase your chances of participating in clinical drug trials that help advance research.

Robert went on to share some **Important Things** to Remember:

- Dementia is sometimes difficult to recognize.
 People work to cover their symptoms embarrassment/stigma
- Raising Awareness and decreasing stigma can increase quality of life for those living with dementia.
 - ...People living with dementia want to continue to:
 - ...Live in their homes without fear of exclusion
 - ...Maintain their social networks
 - ...Remain safe and included in their communities

He talked about knowing **How to Communicate**:

- ✓ Speak clearly and slowly.
- ✓ Treat them with respect and dignity.
- ✓ Smile warmly and make eye contact.
- ✓ Don't argue or take offence to what is said.
- ✓ If needed move to a quiet area that is not too loud or busy.
- ✓ Offer comfort and reassurance.

Robert noted **Different kinds of Dementia-Friendly Spaces**:

Signage and Navigation Tips

- Use simple and easy-to-read signs; black on white/yellow.
- Place signs at eye-level and at key decision points. Flooring:
- Avoid reflection, slippery surfaces, and uneven flooring.

Seating:

 Provide waiting areas that offer recognizable places to sit such as chairs and benches

Lighting

- Provide plentiful, natural lighting.
- Avoid glare and shadows.

Robert then opened the floor to questions.



Iris asked a question about a new drug that was released just this week - what he knows and how he feels about it.

Dr. Jaime complimented Robert on his presentation, and he also added some additional medical information.



Dr. Nabil also complimented Robert on the presentation

saying it was excellent. He just wanted to remind people about the families and caregivers of those living with Dementia. He also warned of the possibility of

financial and physical abuse as well as suggesting people be aware of the possible legal ramifications. They become more vulnerable and susceptible to being taken advantage of.

Ade noted that the Memory Café is still virtual, but it will be opening up within the next few weeks. He also noted that the Township does home visits,

keeping an eye out for the seniors in Oak Park and River Forest communities.

Dr. Nabil shared that he has 100 doses of Pfizer vaccine available for free for anyone over age 12. Anyone interested, please reach out to him.

Robert led us in The Four-Way Test of the Things we Think, Say, and Do, and sent us on our Way.



Congratulations Jennifer Jones! An historic breaking of the glass ceiling moment at the Virtual Rotary Convention: For the first time in Rotary's 116-year-long history, a female Rotarian has accepted the nomination to be Rotary International President!

As of June 1, 2021, there have been just 2 cases of Wild Polio Virus Type 1 in the World.

It has been 129 days since the most recent case was confirmed on January 27, 2021.
