instrumental music programs in Oak Park and River Forest school districts 90, 97, and 200 by loaning instruments and providing music enrichment opportunities to students in need, opening the door to music education and all its related benefits to those students who would otherwise be unable to participate.

Yarrow has lived in Oak Park for 30 years with her husband, Phil. She has a B.A. in English Education from U of I—Champaign and an M.A. in English from Loyola. 






Announcements



Oct. 13 Program: A House in Austin

Maureen Hunter, board member of A House In Austin, thanked the Rotary club for their generosity in supporting the mission of A House in Austin.

Our club contributed funding through the community grants program in 2019 towards building a 45-foot ramp to make the building ADA accessible. In 2020, the club provided bags of musical instruments and props to families served by A House in Austin in order to allow their parent-child music classes to be held over Zoom.

In 2021, the club awarded A House In Austin an additional community grant to make improvements to the previously unusable back yard of their property. Specifically, funding went toward building a trike path.

Hunter explained that A House In Austin was established a few short years ago by Oak Park resident, Erica Hilgart, to address the great divide in parenting resources between the Oak Park and the Chicago Austin community.

The program began modestly with low-cost parent-child music classes being of-fered in a local church on Pine Avenue in Austin. Eventually, a 501 (c) 3 was formed,

and the nonprofit purchased and rehabbed a 3,500 square foot home at 535 Pine Ave., which serves as a home base of a community of parenting support serving families on Chicago's West Side. Hunter introduced Becky Martin, who serves as the co-executive director of A House in Austin, along with Jacquelyn Dortch.

Martin started as a parent in the program, taking music classes with her young

children. When A House in Austin founder, Hilgart, discovered that Martin was a licensed clinical social worker, she soon recruited her to join the team doing home visits to families with children ages birth through 5 years. Martin explained the programs that they are currently offering: home visits, Parent Chat, the music classes for birth through 5, and Fresh Table (a cooking class focused on nutrition and healthy lifestyle.) While they are focused on families with young children, they do expand their summer programming to school-age children. Martin explained that their small size allows them to adapt their programs to the needs of the community.

They are currently serving 30 families. Recently, they have allowed a partner organization Welcome to Fatherhood, which is run by two men from the Austin community, to utilize their space for semi-monthly meetings.

A House in Austin coordinates and partners with other local early intervention organizations and refers their families to other local resources such as New Moms and Catholic Charities.
