














Announcements

Oct. 20 Program: PING!

The Oct. 20 guest speaker was Ginger Yarrow, president of PING! (Providing Instruments for the Next Generation). Yarrow has lived in Oak Park for 30 years with her husband, Phil. She has a B.A. in English Education from University of Illinois Champaign and an M.A. in English from Loyola. She taught English at York High School in Elmhurst for seven years and later worked as an editor for a textbook company. In recent years, she has been co-director of uniforms for the Marching Huskies and a volunteer with Autism Speaks.

Yarrow studied piano for 12 years as a youngster and continues to play for pleasure. She has two boys, 21 and 19, both have played instruments in the D97 and D200 bands

and orchestras. Music, therefore, is alive and well in the Yarrow household! Music was the lifeline to their older son when his autism made it difficult for them to reach him and is now really his life as he is pursuing an associate's degree in music at Triton!

Having attended schools herself in which the music programs paled in comparison to what we have in Districts 90, 97, and 200, Yarrow has been amazed at what young kids can accomplish with the right teaching, instruments, and programming. She is proud to be a part of an organization that provides that opportunity to all of our students, not only with PING!'s instruments but also its parent reach-out, fieldtrips, and mentoring program.

Besides music, Yarrow's interests include reading, history, current affairs, cooking (and eating!), baseball, and travel.

PING! brings equitable access to the instrumental music programs in Oak Park and River Forest school districts 90, 97, and 200 by loaning instruments and providing music enrichment opportunities to students in need, opening the door to music education and all its related benefits to those students who would otherwise be unable to participate.

Yarrow thanked our club for our support we have given PING! over the years. The money received in 2021 was used to purchase items, including practice mutes, music stands, metronome/tuners and upgrades for bows and mouthpieces.

She said that PING! is here in 2021 be-

cause of a couple of parents that were in school in the late '90s they were in one of the elementary school concerts.

"So these parents were sitting and they look around the auditorium in Irving School and realized that the kids on the stage really don't reflect the diversity of their school or their community," she said. "It really put a bee in their bonnet. The first year of PING! was formed, giving 14 kids at Irving School instruments they collected from friends.

"Their point was, we have this wonderfully diverse community, but not everyone has access to these amazing music programs we have in our schools."

This year 2021-22, 132 kids are enrolled in PING!

She said that their mission is a two-tiered program. The firt tier is getting the musical instruments in the kids' hands. The second tier is providing enrichment (music lessons, camps, getting mentoring, having a good instrument, going to concerts).

PING! has more than 250 instruments in its inventory. They do buy some instruments occasionally because some instruments aren't donated.

She said that the violin is the most popular instrument, however, there were a lot of requests for percussion instruments this year.

The other part of what PING! does is the enrichment. They break that down to beginner, middle school and high school.

PING! holds some workshops for the beginner kids and provides scholarships for

summer camps. They make sure they are accessible to our kids.

Last year, during the pandemic, PING! started two new programs, bi-weekly private lessons virtually and a practice program PING! Pals.

In PING! Pals, high school and college-age kids practice with the kids once or twice a week. She said you need more touchpoints to keep people in the program. She said that research shows that kids who play in musical ensembles do better in school. They have a positive peer group and positive role models. All of that is very important, but you can't get all those benefits if you don't stay with the program.

The program for fourth- and fifth-graders is to encourage them so they move on to sixth grade.

Middle school enrichment includes a mentoring program with OPRFHS students; "sleep-away" summer camp scholarships; and District 90 lessons, District 97 music camp and local music scholarships. She said the kids come back with so much more confidence.

A mentor program pairs PING! middle school students with OPRFHS music students for one-on-one bi-weekly lessons.

High school enrichement includes: marching band camp and fees support; weekly private lesson scholarships; extraordinary experience scholarships, such as one for a trip to Europe sponsored by the Performing Arts Department every other year; college application support; and graduating senior financial support.

She said the other thing PING! does is connecting families. They provide a lot of information about concerts. They try to hook families up with discounted or free tickets. They send out texts and emails all the time with flyers about concerts.

They have a lot of partnerships with local music organizations. They host a number of meetings for parents to get together for networking.

The goals of PING! are: to never turn a student in need away; help PING! Students reach their full potential; be a healthy and sustainable organization; use resources efficiently and collaborate with others.

People can help by: spreading the word; donating instruments; contribute financially; and volunteering.
